Team Staffing

Last month we outlined what a fully staffed Junior Rugby League team looked like.

This is a reminder for all parents that our teams cannot participate without the following roles being undertaken by volunteers.

Coach: The General. The leader of the onfield team.

Manager: The Manager looks after the administrative details of the team and helps to manage the other off field positions.

Duty Officials: Each team needs to have two duty officials for all home games and one duty official at away games. **Touch Judge/s:** A role that can be rotated, but volunteers need to complete an online course.

League Safe trainer: All teams must have a League Safe Sports Trainer.

League First Responder: All teams must have a person dedicated to administering first aid should it be required.

There are courses to be completed for anyone wishing to take on one of these roles.

Chez has played most of his life at Redcliffe before a season at Sunshine Coast Falcons. He linked up with coach Nathan at Beerwah and followed him to Valleys. Jared likes to box in his off season to keep fit but playing footy is his first love and playing for a club as steeped in history as the Diehards has hime excited about 2021.

Player Profile

Caitlyn Taleni: "Kaka" is living in Brisbane after growing up in South Auckland. Her older brother played for the Waikato Chiefs in Super Rugby and is now playing in Japan, but this product of family clubs Otahuhu Leopards and Manukau Magpies has a desire to play Rugby League for the Kiwi Ferns.

Caitlyn has come to Valleys from Wests Panthers where she debuted, but the lure of playing under Scott Prince brought her across town to the royal blue and she wants to be part of our history and surpass her limits set in 2019.

SENIOR UPDATE

Our senior Men's BRL A Grade, Reserve Grade and Under 20s and our Northside 2 team all play at Emerson Park on May 15. The following week the Northside 2 team will play at Brighton, while the BRL A grade reserves and Under 20s will all play at Wynnum-Manly.

Our Open Men's team has shared wins and losses and will be looking to get back into the winning seat this weekend. Our BRL A Grade side will also be looking to get back into the winners' circle against Normanby this weekend.





We're going to do something a little different this month. There are a number of Valleys' Premiership sides we can recognise, but this month we are going to recognise a couple of players.

On Saturday, May 8th 1909, in the very first game of Rugby League played by Valleys in the Brisbane competition, they were beaten by South Brisbane by 12-2. On the wing in that game was Norm McGregor. He was "the best of the three quarters, and is very fast. He made one brilliant dash, and was only brought down close to the line."

A week later, "McGregor also played well, and showed plenty of dash and scored an excellent try."

"McGregor was brilliant, extremely so. He would beat his opponents repeatedly and one one occasion, he ran right through the Toombuls."

But on 29th May, 1909, just three weeks later, Valleys had another McGregor in their team. This time it was Dugald (Dug) who had travelled South from the cane fields of Bundaberg. On the occasion of his debut match, "he put up a magnificent game. His form was reminiscent of former Wallaby captain and fullback, Bob McCown."

After just one game, Dug was selected at fullback with Norm on the wing in the probables team to play a possibles combination as a selection trial for the Qld team that would play against New Zealand.

Both McGregors played well enough to be selected for Qld. Valleys 5/8 Harry Dickens and forward, Ern Cartmill were also selected in that team to play New Zealand and before the match went ahead, Bill Abrahams was also included as the halfback of that 1909 Qld team.

Dug McGregor, "in his first big match had a large handful and was quite as good as one would have expected."

Despite a loss to NZ when playing for Qld, Dug McGregor was selected to play for Australia, as the youngest Kangaroo selected at 19 years and 5 days. He impressed in their 12-5 win. At one point he ran from 25 to 25 dodging beautifully before

passing to a support player. It was also noted at the concluding stages that he was tackling brilliantly.

As that first year of Brisbane's Rugby League club competition continued, both Dug and Norm McGregor played brilliant football. In the semi final against Toombul, Dug, "played without a blemish", while Norm "was a star three-quarter."

Later in the year Dug continued his selection in the Qld and Australian teams for matches against the NZ Maori.

Then, on Saturday, 4th September at the Brisbane Cricket Ground, Valleys were to play South Brisbane in the Grand Final. With Souths on top early and leading 4-0 after a couple of successful penalty goals, Valleys fullback, Dug McGregor, was the first to crack the Souths defensive line and after a superb run, scored the first try of the game. Valleys went on to win that first Premiership by 22-4.

In 1910 McGregor continued his stellar form for Valleys and played for Qld and Australia. In 1911, he was lured to North Brisbane with a number of other high profile representative players in an effort by North Brisbane to secure a Premiership. It was to no avail as Valleys, playing as Valley/ Toombul, won the 1911 Premiership.

During 1911, it was widely reported that Dug McGregor had been the form fullback in the country and his selection for the Kangaroo Tour to England was assured. In fact, no Qld players were selected to tour England in 1911.

This may have soured McGregor's feelings for the game as he did not play in 1912 or beyond and his scintillating attack and brilliant defence was no longer seen on the fields of Brisbane's Rugby League competition. Instead, McGregor went South to Sydney, where he played the next three seasons for Glebe's Dirty Reds, also representing NSW in 1912.

All up, in just 6 years of football, Dug McGregor played 2 games for Brisbane, 13 games for Qld, 5 for NSW and 4 matches for Australia. There are numerous mentions of Dugald McGregor in the newspapers of the day and he was certainly a champion, who excelled, gracing the fields of Brisbane's top Rugby League competition for that short period of time. A champion Diehard!
